Alleged Rozzi embezzlement could have begun in 2002

An amended felony complaint postponed the Feb. 28 arraignment for Ted Rozzi, the former Corona-Norco Unified School **District** assistant superintendent of facilities, who was arrested Nov. 7. Rozzi has been charged with 30 felony counts of allegedly embezzling \$1.17 million of public funds from the district.

The amended complaint, filed Feb. 27, claims the alleged embezzlement began as early as July 23, 2002 instead of Jan. 10, 2011 as initially presumed. The new arraignment date was set for April 17.

It is unclear if the amended complaint alleges more funds taken over the additional eight-year period or if it was changed to include the total of \$2.6 million uncovered by the state's Fiscal Crisis & **Management Assistance Team** in an audit released in November. That report was ordered by County Superintendent of Schools Judy White.

Edward Mierau, chief executive officer and chief financial

officer of Neff Construction also was arrested Nov. 7 and is scheduled to enter a plea April 17. Mierau has been charged with 27 felony counts for allegedly assisting Rozzi.

According to **Brian Rokos**, staff writer for The Press-Enterprise, "Neither man is in custody. Their passports have been seized and their real estate assets have been frozen. Rozzi has been charged with misappropriation of public



funds, money laundering and being a public official having a financial interest in a contract made by him. Mierau has been charged with the first two crimes and helping Rozzi profit from the contracts."

The two are accused of a scheme that diverted school construction funds paid by Neff into personal banking and credit card accounts held by Rozzi.

Election undecided but it looks good for Supervisor Jeffries

While the state's Primary Election was Tuesday, many outstanding ballots remain to be counted – about 125,000 vote-by-mail, 50,000 provisional and 10,000 damaged ballots that require duplication.

It looks as if the margin Riverside County **First District Supervisor Kevin Jeffries** led with on Wednesday will remain sizable, with a simple majority of the votes cast for him and it's likely he will not have to face a November runoff.

Jeffries noted, "The Registrar of Voters still has some ballots to count but the election results are looking real good. I want to thank the residents of **Temescal Valley** for their support and the close working relationship we have with the community to help resolve the quality of life challenges we all face in our growing county."

It appears **Assemblywoman Melissa Melendez**, who is running for **Jeff Stone**'s unexpired term in the state's **28**th **Senate District**, will face a May 12 special election runoff with the second-place finisher.

No candidate running for Melendez's **67thAssembly District** seat received a simple majority of votes cast and it's probable that race is headed for a November runoff between the top two vote-getters.

Incumbent Representative Ken Calvert has a commanding lead in the 42nd Congressional District. In congressional races, the top two vote-getters advance to the November runoff.

Here's how the tallies looked Wednesday morning and, as of press time, the next update is scheduled 6 p.m., Friday, March 6.

CALLS, CRIME DOWN; ARRESTS UP IN FEBRUARY

Lt. Donovan Brooks of the Lake Elsinore Sheriff's Station has provided statistics on Part I crimes that occurred here in January and February.

Part I crimes include serious felonies and property crimes; Part II crimes are non-serious felonies and misdemeanors.

The station received **333 calls** for service from Temescal Valley during February – 67 fewer calls than received in January.

Twentyfive calls in January

were for Part I crimes; 10 in February. There were no homicides, rapes or robberies for the two-month period. Here is the breakdown:

Assaults – 3 in January and 0 in February.

Burglaries – 3 and 0.
Grand/Petty Theft – 14 and

Vehicle Theft – 4 and 2. Theft from Vehicle – 1 and 1.

There were 11 arrests in January – 4 felonies and 7 misdemeanors. February saw 15 arrests – 1 felony and 14 misdemeanors.

Vandalisms reported for January and February were 15 and 4, respectively. Disturbing the Peace calls numbered 35 and 36.

Lt. Brooks also reminds residents to leave nothing of value in their vehicles and to lock them when parking in driveways and on neighborhood streets.

WELCOME, 2020!

As promised in January's newsletter, this month's edition will review transportation impacts on Temescal Valley over the past decade, plus development – new projects yet to be approved by the county and projects approved but not yet built. Let's begin with development – and remember, it's a long, time-consuming process to get new projects built in Temescal Valley

DEVELOPMENT – WHAT'S NEW?

WEIRICK/KNABE CENTER

An application filed only this week seeks approval for a small commercial center to be built on 2.85 gross acres – a triangular plot of land between the southbound I-15 Weirick on-ramp and Weirick and Knabe roads.

Planned is a 2,695-square-foot convenience store, a 2,462-square-foot fast-food restaurant and a gas station.

Filed by **KWC Engineers**, the application has been scheduled for a **March 12** meeting before the county Planning Department's **Development Advisory Committee**. Once county staff's initial planning review is complete, the project will be scheduled for a public hearing.

INDUSTRIAL COMPLEX

Plans for an industrial business park and commercial center on property formerly known as the "Hydro-Conduit" or "Rinker" sites have been submitted to the Planning Department by Proficiency Capital, LLC.

The 61.9 gross acres are located along Temescal Canyon and Dawson Canyon roads, across the street from the Shell station.

The project calls for nine industrial warehouse buildings and four retail commercial buildings. The warehouse buildings range from 36,500 to 227,400 square feet, and retail buildings range from 2,900 to 4,300 square feet and include a gas station with convenience store and car wash, a fueling position canopy, and two drive-thru restaurants.

Once the project is complete, the portion of Dawson Canyon Road that runs along the east boundary of the property (formerly known as Park Canyon Road), will be paved and dedicated to the county, according to a Proficiency spokesman.





TOM'S FARMS EXPANSION

When **Sunny Hwang** purchased **Tom's Farms** in June 2017, he said he had plans for eventual expansion of the now 49-year-old amusement park. Hwang had purchased the **Trilogy Golf Club** a year earlier and there was much maintenance and fixup to do on both properties.

KOK Development, on behalf of Tom's Farms, filed an application last month with the county for the conditional use permit necessary to facilitate what's known as the "Tom's Farms Expansion Project."

If approved, the expansion will be done in phases and will not begin until flooding issues on the 45-acre property are resolved.

The expansion includes an 8,559-square-foot banquet building, a 1,800-square-foot multi-purpose facility, 81,573 square feet of retail/commercial buildings, a 6,790-square-foot bakery with drive-thru, a 12,844-square-foot greenhouse, a 6,850-square-foot animal barn, a 4,400-square-foot amusement park building and an 8,198-square-foot water park. Extensive work will be done to the grounds and the proposal includes 753 parking spaces with events scheduled throughout the year.


KOK Development also submitted an application seeking a process that would allow a digital sign on the property. The county does not have an ordinance for electronic billboards. An ordinance would establish zoning locations, development and operation standards, and a permitting process to allow for onsite electronic signage to provide information only about Tom's Farms and, hopefully, community events happening in Temescal Valley.

GLEN IVY HOT SPRINGS RESORT EXPANSION

County planners are now reviewing a Specific Plan submitted by **GOCO Hospitality** for the Glen Ivy Hot Springs Resort Expansion. The Environmental Impact Report has yet to be submitted.

The Specific Plan creates 17 planning areas on a total of 82.5 acres allowing for a mixture of 255 short-term and long-term residential units, a 165-room boutique hotel, spas, pools, fitness studios, meeting rooms and new commercial uses including restaurants. Open space for recreation would total 32.2 acres. About 14.5 acres would be set aside for permanent conservation.

The public will have the opportunity to submit comments on the expansion.

R.J. NOBLE COMPANY

The asphalt manufacturer, located on 33.5 acres on Maitri Road, is seeking a revision to its surface mining permit and a variance that would bring the business into compliance with regulations that were overlooked when a new plant was built on the property in 2017.

The revision to the existing permit and reclamation plan includes:

- Conversion of the existing old asphalt plant to a cold mix asphalt plant.
- Increase the new hot mix asphalt plant production from 600,000 tons to maximum of 1.2 million tons per year.
- Issue a permit for an existing pre-manufactured office building and change the permitted feed silos to feed bunkers on the mining plan.
- Revise the cut slope configuration on the mine and reclamation plans to reflect as-built conditions.
- Allow the importation of clean/inert soil.

The variance would allow 24-hour operations and reduce the setback for the asphalt plant from the west-adjacent property.

CANNABIS BUSINESS

River Leaf, a new cannabis retailer, has filed an application for a conditional use permit to operate a micro-business in an existing 8,582-square-foot, two-story commercial building on the west side of Temescal Canyon Road at Dawson Canyon Road.

There will be public hearings and residents will have the opportunity to comment on the project.

LEROY PLAZA


An application has been filed to construct two commercial buildings in the **Wildrose Business Park** on 2.33 acres on the east side of Temescal Canyon Road and the north side of Leroy Road.

If approved, the buildings will be 11,500 and 18,750 square feet, and house different types of businesses, including retail commercial.



ORIGINALLY APPROVED IN 2009: Plans for the 54-home development to be built by Lafferty Homes were revised in 2016 and approved by the county in 2017. When constructed, the homes will be sizable and sit on large lots.

DEVELOPMENT – WHAT'S APPROVED?

HUNT-LAWSON DEVELOPMENT

Originally approved in 2009 and with revisions approved in 2017, **Lafferty Homes** plans to build 54 homes on 48.6 acres in the Hunt-Lawson neighborhood.

One- and two-story single-family residences are planned with a maximum height of 35 feet. The average lot size is 19,191 square feet with the minimum lot size set at 12,000 square feet.

The primary entrance to the gated community will be along the private section of Lawson Road where it joins Hunt Road. It's unknown when construction will begin.

TEMESCAL VILLAGE

Approval was given by the county in June 2018 to allow construction of an 80-unit condominium project on the east side of Temescal Canyon Road at Campbell Ranch Road and the I-15.

The Board of Supervisor's vote was 4-1 with **Kevin Jeffries** agreeing with the public protest that the project was too dense. It's unknown when construction will begin.

A LOOK BACK ON THE PAST DECADE

What was once a quiet valley became a county parking lot with the opening of the **91 freeway tolled Express Lanes** through Corona in **March 2017**. Just a short time later, work started on the northern section of a new **I-15 Express Lanes** project from Cajalco Road to the county line, impacting **Temescal Valley** ever since.

It began in **2008**, when the **Riverside County Transportation Commission** (RCTC), received authority to extend the toll lanes eight miles into Corona from the Orange County border to the I-15 freeway. Construction was massive as they worked on **\$1.4 billion-worth** of the **\$2 billion-project**.

Traffic apps were redirecting I-15 motorists to take **Temescal Canyon Road** and other local routes. Residents were trapped in their neighborhoods, students struggled to get to school on time as they needed to go to the next city over for the closest high school, and other projects were coming online faster than they were being finished. All in all, traffic was a mess this past decade.

In **2011**, a pipe which we later learned was part of the **Inland Empire Brine Line**, sprang a leak near the Dos Lagos shopping center in Corona. The line, which carries salty water from industrial properties for disposal, is buried alongside five miles of Temescal Canyon Road. Diversion pipes were installed above ground and work to replace the old line began in **2014**.

In **2016**, work on the line came to a standstill because of a contract dispute. In **2017**, Temescal Canyon Road was torn up and reduced to one lane to finish the construction by year's end.

Shortly afterward, the **Riverside County Transportation Department** started its own project in the area -- the widening of Temescal Canyon Road from two to four lanes combined with straightening out "Deadman's Curve" and adding new pavement for the entire area.

By this time, commuters driving through the area learned not-sogreat tricks such as bypassing traffic illegally by not turning in turning lanes, making U-turns on private roads and driveways, driving on the shoulders and blocking intersections during red lights.

People turned to Facebook to express their frustration and even shared pictures of the offenders, oftentimes their neighbors. There was a lot happening, but the timing was tough.

By the end of **2018**, RCTC began looking for a consultant to study extending the I-15 freeway tolled Express Lanes through Temescal Valley and into Lake Elsinore. The commission approved funding for the study in **March 2019**, and a consultant was chosen. Public meetings were held in **November 2019** and construction could begin as early as **2025** if funding is secured.

That brings us into the new decade. Will traffic play as big a role in the frustration of Temescal Valley as it did during

OLIVE BRANCH CHURCH

The church, currently located in El Cerrito, received final county approval in 2017 to build a new worship center and a K-8 campus plus preschool on 14.53 acres at the northwest corner of Temescal Canyon Road and Trilogy Parkway.

At the time of approval, plans called for the project to be built in phases. At buildout, the church will seat 1,250 worshippers and the multi-purpose fellowship hall will seat 800. The anticipated enrollment for the preschool is 96 children and 216 students for the school. There will be 605 parking spaces. It's unknown when construction will begin.

TOSCANA VILLAGE

The county approved the 27-acre commercial retail center at the northwest corner of Temescal Canyon Road and Indian Truck Trail in January 2019. At that time, **Speedway Development**, **LLC** indicated that grading for the first phase of the project would begin in the second quarter of 2019.

Construction has been delayed because of a lawsuit filed in May 2019 by an anonymous group calling itself "Partners of Temescal Canyon." The legal action was filed against Riverside County with Speedway being named as Real Party in Interest. The lawsuit alleges the environmental impact report and traffic impact analysis for the project were flawed.

If completed, the center would have a gas station, restaurants, supermarket, and 194,000 square feet of office and retail space. There would be 15 buildings and 1,138 parking spaces.

RV & SELF-STORAGE FACILITY

The county in December gave the go-ahead to **Rancon Group** to build a public storage and RV facility on a 7.69-acre parcel on the east side of Temescal Canyon Road south of Hostettler Road.

Planned for the estimated \$17 million project are 1,304 storage units and a 32-space RV storage area. The project will be built in two phases with 652 units planned for the first stage and 652 units in the second phase. Rancon anticipates opening the facility in 15 months.
